



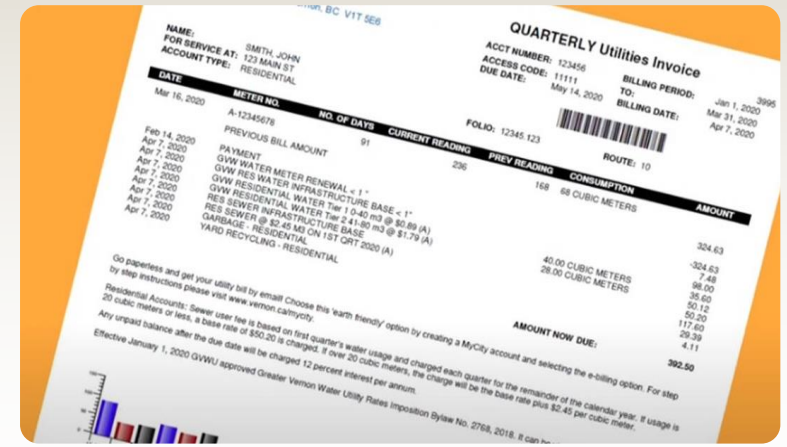

Reading for Pleasure

- Unfortunately, only half the population of adults now read books regularly (The State of the Nations Reading Report, 2024).
- More worryingly, 1 in 6 children (8.5 million!) struggle to read at all (The State of the Nations Reading Report, 2024).
- Reading doesn't only make us more aware and informed, but more empathetic, understanding of other people and cultures, and supports our health, wellbeing, and ability to learn new skills and communicate effectively.
- We want our BVP family to develop and continue a passion for reading!





Our aims for children here at BVP

- We want our children to enjoy reading a wide range of texts and be able to talk about what they are reading and their respective authors.
- We want children to develop skills that are key in understanding and comprehending a wide range of texts.
- To continue to develop on their mechanical skills of reading and become fluent and free readers.





What reading looks like at BVP

- As part of our teaching of English, children access books which are recommended by the CLPE (Centre for Literacy in Primary Education).
- These books are explored as a class, and link with our writing process. As part of the process, they use skills that are key in understanding and comprehending texts they are reading.
- In addition, children get the opportunity to enjoy a wide range of quality children's books as part of whole class reading for pleasure.
- Some children may also have access to banded books to support their reading fluency.

VIPERS is an acronym to aid the recall of the 6 reading domains as part of the UK reading curriculum.

These are key areas that children need to know and understand in order to improve their comprehension of text.



How do children access books in school



- Children weekly access the library, where they can take books out and enjoy reading in a quiet and peaceful setting. Children may select books which they are unable to read independently.
- In the classroom, children can access their own class reading corner, where there are a variety of books and other reading materials suited to their age.
- We have recommended reads in our book corners – these are recommended by other children and adults in school.

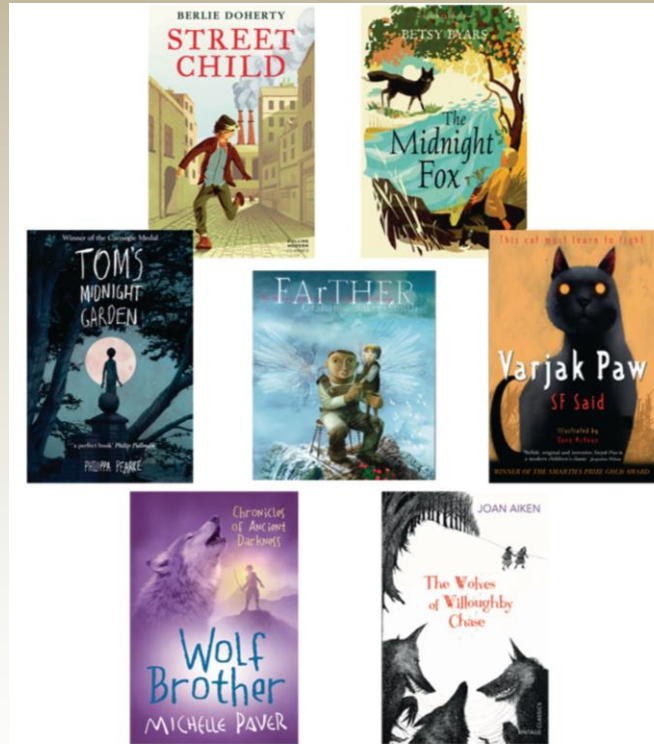

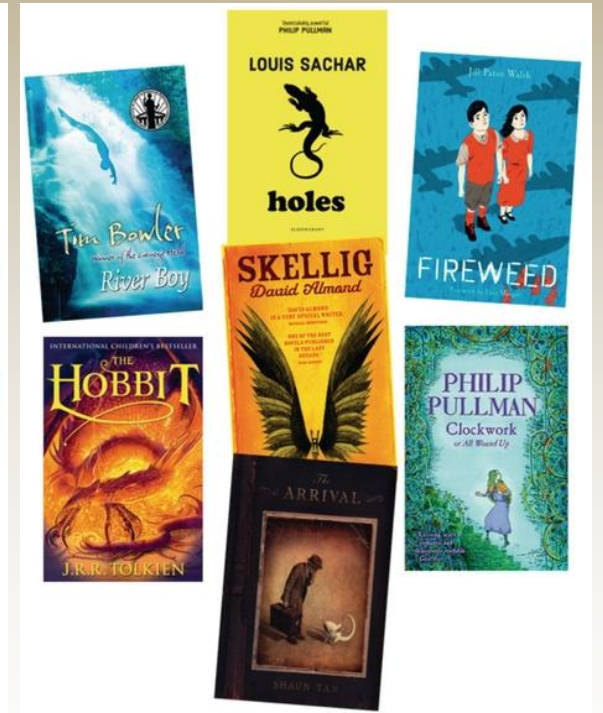
